- Equipment Subsidy Needs to be discussed with WAFA full committee meeting before 30<sup>th</sup> June 2014. If agreed, contribution would not be available till new financial year.
- 2) <u>Tournament payments and</u> <u>Refereeing</u> - Ben Peden received copy of email from Cavaliers which he gave to Lisa Blyth for discussion.
- <u>National Cadets</u> WAFA has arranged a return airfare with Virgin through Flight Centre for \$640.00. About 20 fencers will be competing. It seems very well organised.

### **Tournament Payment**

Here is an official word from FencingWA on the newly introduced system of payment for competition entry.

Due to a number of uncertainties with the payment system for tournaments, here are some clarifications on how to enter.

1. Payment is to be done online via the FencingWA website <u>http://www.fencingwa.com/#!c</u> <u>ompetition-entry/cez2</u>

2. Payment by the Monday prior to the tournament will incur a fee of \$5. To enter click the "Earlybird Fee" option as shown.

3. Payment on Tuesday or Wednesday will cost \$10. To enter at this stage, please click the "Regular Fee" option.

4. Payment after Wednesday will incur a late entry fee of \$20. <u>This can be paid on the</u> day at the competition but bear in mind that your entry has to be registered online via sporting pulse.

Payment can also be done within the next few days after a competition but failure to do so will bar you from future competitions and remove your ranking points.

### New Tournament Rules

**FencingWA** has introduced a new system of fees for entry into state tournaments this year. In turn, it will also commence a program of paid referees and endeavour to standardise and improve the level of refereeing.

It seeks to tighten the rules for online registration to combat the problem of 'no show'. This should enable an improvement in organisation and preparation for each competition.

To clear up a few uncertainties, **Cavaliers** had several questions to ask **FencingWA**.

# Why can't we register for multiple competitions, multiple people?

In the past, we have had an increasing problem with 'no shows' when people have booked up ahead. This system increases the likelihood that those who sign up will actually turn up.

### Why must we pay the additional 6% booking fee?

This internet program has the smallest fee we could find. We would be happy to consider an alternative site with cheaper fees if you know of one.

### The only payment method is via Credit Card. How should those who don't have a Credit Card pay?

The preferred method is with Credit Card. We do allow bank transfers for those who need to, but these must be manually monitored. Please contact the Tournament Director if there are any problems.

### How secure is the site?

The system conforms to the PCI Data Security Standard. There are details on the site.

### What is the penalty for entering the competition without prepayment?

Fencers entering the competition without the correct registration procedure will have their ranking points stripped and will not be allowed to enter future competitions.

## Who will be responsible for organising the referees for each tournament?

FencingWA will provide this information to the DT prior to the tournament.

### What are the expectations of the referees?

This needs to be outlined more clearly and we are making an ongoing effort to communicate these issues by publishing the rules to the whole fencing community.

### How will the host club be able to monitor the referee program on the day?

It is the DT and Tournament Committee's responsibility to make sure that the referees fill in the 'Sign In' sheets.

### Who is supervising the referees to ensure that the required standard is upheld?

Where possible, a senior referee or coach will be present to supervise the referees. Unfortunately, it is not always possible to have such people available.

Thanks go to Lisa Blyth, the Tournament Director for FencingWA, who provided the answers to our questions.

### Would You Like to be a Referee?

If you or anyone else is interested in taking a greater role in tournament organisation I would encourage you to apply to join our Tournament Committee.

We are currently fairly small so would welcome any additional members.

You do not need to be a WAFA Committee member or attend Committee Meetings to join the Tournament Committee - it's just about getting the comps organised and is done largely by email.

It would be great to see more involvement from more members of more clubs.

### Fencing for the Visually Impaired

### This article is taken from the UK Fencing Magazine THE SWORD April 2014

Norfolk (UK) Fencing Club has for some time supported the provision of local initiatives to physically disabled enable people, those with learning difficulties, including attention deficit disorders, and the visually impaired to try fencing (The Sword, October 2009 - Fencing for the Blind). These events, in the main, have been organised by John Croxon, a specialist coach.

Whilst fencing might seem an unlikely sport for the visually impaired, there are historical accounts of the blind engaging in the activity. It is known that in the past the military have encouraged this as part of the rehabilitation of individuals who have suffered war injuries (The Sword, January 2010 – letters, **Mark Barton**).

The first blind person to engage in the sport in Norwich (2005) had been registered blind since birth. Through **John Croxon's** endeavours, he achieved grade 4 in foil and 1 in sabre. To enable him to fence on the piste with other club members involved a number of methods being tried and tested, as well as the development of special equipment.

In 2009, having liaised with British Blind Sport, a number of come-and-try sessions were organised. One of the first participants was Charles Townsend. Initially he lacked confidence and was very reliant on his white cane, which he carried even during the warm-up sessions. Over time this aid was set aside.

His family observed that his general confidence had noticeably grown since taking up fencing. **Charles** became a full member of the club, participating in normal club lessons/free play and social events. It was particularly encouraging to see the positive effect this had on his life beyond the limits of the fencing salle.

An annual competition for the disabled, which included the visually impaired, is organised by the French Disabled Sports Federation (FDSA). John Croxon attended one of the events and competed blindfolded, which was greatly appreciated by the organisers.

Later he attended a training camp organised by the FDSA, which led to a more formal introduction to the visually impaired group by **Laszlo Jakab**, the British Disabled Fencing Association coach.

As a consequence and because of the French interest in the specialist equipment John has been instrumental in developing, he was invited to a competition in Pollestres, south-western France, and was also able to negotiate an entry for **Charles Townsend**.

Apart from overcoming the financial hurdles Charles had to undergo a crash course in epee, given that the French visually impaired fencers are restricted to the use of this weapon. He managed to secure a 4th place, for which he was awarded a medal and a trophy, reflecting the fact that he was the first British visually impaired fencer to compete in an international competition.

**John Croxon** was also presented with a trophy by the organisers in recognition of his work with the disabled. Norfolk is fortunate in that **John** continues to work with the disabled. This requires a considerable degree of commitment, patience, fortitude and ingenuity.

It was hoped that the Paralympics would result in more financial support for disabled sports, which might stimulate more specialist coaching, but this has yet to materialise to any extent at club level. *(Sword Magazine)*

### **Fencing Profile**

### Gillian Kings-Lynne This is your (fencing) life!

Gillian's first experience at the Club began in 1993 when she brought her three children to start fencing. At the time, Cavs met in the old Mt Lawley SHS gym about 50 metres from the new facility. It was a small gym with wooden floors and the Club consisted of only a small number of members.

From the outset she saw there was a need for organisation and the following year she took on the role of Secretary. Lists and registers were created for everything, as well as a number of policies which assisted in putting the Club back on track.

The strictest of these policies was the full affiliation of all members, which helped to support applications for funding but more importantly to show that Cavs was serious about supporting the state and national bodies.

A number of new clubs used the Cavs administration and treasurer's records as a model when starting up.

In 1995 Gillian also took on the role of Secretary of WAFA and together with Nigel Nutt (President), Mahmud Jaffar (Treasurer) and others helped to rebuild WAFA.

Over the next few years there was massive growth which saw WA become the third largest fencing state in Australia. Much of this success can be attributed to Gillian's role which was effectively full-time.

Gillian is well known for many things in fencing including the newsletters - Gillian started both *WAFA Waffle* and the Cavs newsletter, *The Fencer* - and both were essential reading to keep up to date with important news and events. If it wasn't in either of the newsletters it wasn't worth knowing.

Gillian contributed to fencing in so many ways and one of those was playing host to visiting coaches where they stayed in the "Coaches Room" at her Floreat home.



There were coaches who stayed for months at a time from Ireland (Kevin Dunne), England (Andy Martin), South Australia (Leon Thomas) and Victoria (Pieter Leeuwenburgh). There were many others who stayed for shorter periods.

Gillian would also find a car or let them use one of her own. Gillian would help plan their coaching schedule during their stay, help organise their holidays in Western Australia and provide maps and directions to get to the various clubs and schools. Often the only cost was that they perform some routine maintenance around the house.

Gillian's dedication to fencing in Western Australia has been tireless. Much of the growth has been possible because of systems put in place to record memberships. Her steadfast support of policies such as 100% affiliation has been recognised by many with Life Membership to the Club in 2002, an AFF Excellence Award for Outstanding Service in 2003, Life Membership to WAFA in 2008 and a Valued Volunteer Award by the City of Stirling in 2011.

Nowadays Gillian is still involved with the Club helping in the planning of its 60<sup>th</sup> anniversary and is still relied upon as our central memory for events that have happened over the past 20 years.

We have been very fortunate to have had such a dedicated member, especially one who has never fenced.

### A GENTLEMAN'S GUIDE TO DUELLING ETIQUETTE by Jared Kirby

### This article is taken from the UK Fencing Magazine THE SWORD April 2014

William Shakespeare may well have learned to fence at the Blackfriars school of Vincentio Saviolo. arguably the most influential fencing master in Elizabethan England. His book published in 1595 was divided into two parts: the first covering the use of the rapier and dagger, and the second addressing the subject of honour and the duel. It is this second part that has now been updated by the American historical martial arts specialist Jared Kirby, with explanatory notes to make it more accessible to the modern reader and a biography of the author.

The impact of **Saviolo's** book on London's cultural scene was huge. It led to Shakespeare and other authors introducing Italian fencing terms into their plays. Romeo and Juliet, as well as mentioning moves such as the passado and stoccata, includes references to the Italian style of fencing in such phrases as "the very butcher of a silk button".

The book considers the causes of duels, rules concerning challenger and defender, the nature of verbal injury and what quarrels are worth fighting over, degrees of nobility, the basis of satisfaction, and the valour and virtue of women.

It may be a late 16th century duelling code, but it can help the modern fencer understand the gravity and seriousness that lies at the heart of all swordplay. Reading it makes one aware that what constitutes honourable behaviour has not changed a great deal in 400 years.
